Waking Up to White Privilege

The Black Lives Matter planning group and our Multicultural Ministry Initiative are supporting us in thinking about the personal experiences as well as the institutional and systemic conditions that give some people more safety and opportunity than others. My awareness dawned when I was ten years old, and a member of a touring Black choir stayed in our home, because the local hotel wouldn't give them rooms. I wrote about this moment in this poem, which is part of a collection of poems, *Dakota Fruit*, about my South Dakota childhood.

Wings Over Jordan

I wake to singing — *Who is Sylvia?* — Schubert, I know that.

One voice lower, winding like a river underneath a high soprano.

Voices vibrating like harp strings, transcending Mother's normal

warbling folding laundry. At the piano, I discover two strangers,

one the shape and color of my cello, a skin shade new to me-

and Mother, snapping her fingers to Boogie Blues, while the stranger

plays, half-dancing. Then Mother raises her arms, twirls her hands-

I check myself for fever. I learn the stranger came on a bus named

Wings Over Jordan, her choir curled in seats from Missouri to Sioux City.

Stopped to sing in Jewell—one gas pump, church—and Waterloo.

Hardboiled eggs from paper bags, and farmers warning of twisters

splitting barns, the choir persevering like the pony express

to bring their singing to our stage, just to get shut out by our one hotel,

that heap of bricks on Main Street. All across the town, folks—

some folks, Mother said—tuned their uprights, made up beds for strangers.

Half-way into the room, I watched her standing close behind a friend,

bending to see the page. Throats bare, bodies lifting, falling —

Mother's chin brushing the woman's hair.

This experience revealed contradictions about my town—a business shut people out, but townspeople (some townspeople) took them in. It gave me a new understanding of my mother—how quickly she

bonded with a stranger around music, how beautiful her singing voice was, and how electrically excited she could be. It revealed the sober history and resilience of the members of the *Wings Over Jordan* choir. When they returned the following year, my mother's new friend stayed with us again and they sang together. -*Cathy Morocco, Board of Trustees*

Come to share some of the men's art and find out what it's like to enter a different world where people aren't so different.

What can we learn from artists about how to create a fulfilling life, and how to find hope in our darkest moments? Three FUSN artists - a painter, a musician and a sculptor - will describe the nature of art and what it brings to their lives. Come and consider the artistic facets of your life, and indeed, explore the possibility that our own lives ARE our our ART!

July 24 - Multifaith Relationships - Em Mueller, Curt Lamb

Most FUSN families have diverse religious backgrounds. What passions are generated by the religions we grew up with? How do we create vibrant families that honor diverse passions? August 7 - Jimmy Tingle renowned Boston comedian, will share thoughts on humor and humanity.

August 14 - Gratitude as a Spiritual Practice - Betsy Levitt

Studies show that people who practice gratitude enjoy greater happiness, improved ability to deal with adversity and stronger relationships. Come to hear friends' stories of thankfulness and ideas for building more gratitude into your life.

August 21 - Self-actualization in Beethoven - Lois Shapiro

Many consider Beethoven one of the visionaries who significantly shaped our sense of ourselves as "Human" - beings, endowed with a rich and complex inner life, capable of reflection as well as action in the world. In learning about, and listening to one of Beethoven's last piano sonatas, his Op. 110, we will look at the nature of a musical process that rises to a metaphor for our own consciousness.

August 28 - Marking the Sacred - Mandy Beal

Drawing on recent experiences in Israel, Mandy Beal will explore the theme of religious symbol and rituals. Mandy is a candidate for Unitarian Universalist ministry, and the Ministerial Intern at the First Parish in Lincoln. Mandy is also FUSN's former Youth Program Coordinator, and FUSN is Mandy's congregational sponsor.
