# FROM THE BOARD, ON GROWING MINISTERS

FUSN recently has been given another opportunity to help grow a new UU minister! In November, the Board approved a request from Mandy Beal to serve as her "sponsoring congregation" in her application to the UUA for full ministerial credentials.

FUSN has a proud history of nurturing and perhaps inspiring future UU ministers. For many years, we've served as an internship site, allowing a divinity student to work under our senior minister for a year or two and get to know and help lead all aspects of FUSN life. We hope to return to this intern tradition at some point soon. We've also seen staff members (e.g., Anne Bancroft) and congregation members (e.g., Cheryl Lloyd, Michelle Walsh, Holly Haynes) who've felt the call to ministry during their time at FUSN and have been supported in their journeys by the congregation in many ways.

You may remember Mandy Beal as last year's Youth Programs Coordinator. She is also a divinity student at Andover Newton Theological Seminary (ANTS) in Newton Centre, expecting to graduate in May of 2016. She is currently serving a 2-year internship with our congregation in Lincoln, and she will be ready for the UUA's ministerial credentialing process in 2017.

Mandy had hoped to continue working with FUSN youth for at least a second year, but that was impossible due to the requirements of her internship. At the same time, however, Mandy felt she'd connected deeply with FUSN, both through her work and in worship and personal conversation. Even though her internship duties will keep her away from FUSN most Sundays, she felt strongly that FUSN was the right "home congregation"

for her and she recently became a FUSN member.

I want to share with you, in Mandy's own words, some of the ways in which FUSN has touched and nurtured Mandy in her ministerial development.

In requesting our congregation's sponsorship, Mandy wrote, "I've worked in several Unitarian Universalist congregations over the years, but none of them have impacted me the way that FUSN did, and still does." She particularly mentioned:

- the "theological and ideological diversity of the FUSN community, and the care with which this is treated."
- while recognizing that "the diversity that I found so refreshing and appealing" was also a "source of difficulty for a congregation dealing with a divisive issue," she saw our diversity not as a liability but as an asset; she cited "many conversations with FUSN community members and lay leaders that came from a place of love; love for the people of the FUSN community, and love for the complexity that the congregation stands for."
- "the unflagging level of support I have felt from this community," as she honed existing skills related to RE and emerging skills in pastoral care and preaching. She wrote, "I was very nervous the first time that I stood in the FUSN pulpit, but as I looked out into the pews, I saw the faces of people that I know truly cared about me and wanted me to succeed. My ministerial formation will challenge me in ways that I cannot expect. It would mean so much to me to know that the community that supported me in that moment is supporting me through the years to come."

Although we won't see her at FUSN most Sunday mornings, Mandy has offered to help us out with the occasional service or in other ways, and she's eager to share with us her experience studying interfaith religious education in Israel/Palestine in January 2016, sometime after she returns.

As her sponsoring congregation, our role is primarily to offer her support, feedback, and friendship. We may also have the opportunity to participate in her ordination process a few years from now. We are pleased that Mandy has chosen us as her home congregation from which to launch her career as a minister, and we wish her much growth and success in her journey!

Finally, here's a hearty Happy Holiday wish to all of you from the Board!

**Daytime Reading Group on Criminal Justice** Forming. At the suggestion of several people, we are considering a Criminal Justice daytime reading group for the winter months of January, February and March. The book we have chosen is "Caught: The Prison State and the Lockdown of American Politics" by Marie Gottschalk, Professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania.
