BY-LAWS & GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

In early 2006, the FUSN Board of Trustees began an examination of the Society's governance structure. This examination led to the formation of a Governance Committee that undertook a thorough analysis of our membership, how we govern ourselves, and how our staff performs its work. This involved interviews with congregants, the staff and other area UU congregations, studies of various governance models, and the identification of three models for the Board to consider. The FY2009 Board analyzed this invaluable body of work and ultimately defined our current governance structure, including a policy-focused Board of Trustees and an Operations Council.

We are now in our fourth year of operation under this model and are seeing positive benefits. A By-Laws Committee was formed in FY12 and has developed a proposed set of amendments specifically focused on amending the By-Laws to reflect the current structure.

On Sunday, Jan. 27, following Coffee Hour, there will be a congregational meeting to introduce these amendments and to receive feedback. A copy of the proposed amendments will be circulated in advance. An evening meeting will also take place on a date to be determined in February. Then, on March 17, there will be a special meeting of the Society for the purpose of voting on the proposed By-Laws amendments

We look forward to your participation in culminating the hard work of so many over the past six years.

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FUSN TREASURES

For over 40 years, Anne and Allan Hartman have brought treasures to the First Unitarian Society in Newton. In her decades-long role as co-coordinator of FUSNs Silent Auction, Anne has spent numerous Saturdays exploring estate sales to find special items for the Auction. For years at Ferry Beach, Allan created elaborate Treasure Hunts with riddles leading to hidden items. Once he even hid a watermelon in a mailbox! (After a little persuasion, the winning team agreed to share their fruity prize with the other team.)

In addition to such tangible treasures, Anne and Allan have contributed countless hours of creativity and hard work to help the FUSN community grow as a spiritual home for themselves and others. Allan recalls, "Back in the early 1970s RE was a one-room-schoolhouse style program with only about 8 - 10 kids sitting all together. As RE grew, Dick Mezger and Newton Teixeira and I worked on a curriculum that grew over time." Allan also observes how much the annual stewardship drive has changed since he first started working on it. "Back then it was all done on one day; we'd ask people to stay home on the Sunday afternoon that was 'Canvass Sunday,' and members of the team would knock on doors to visit. Once the team members finished meeting with people, they'd come to the Alliance Room where Peter Witt and I would sit with our calculators, tallying up the pledges to see if we'd reached the proposed budget. There would be some sweep during the following week, but it was pretty much all done on one day."

Anne and Allan have also participated in Social Justice activities, Adult RE classes, and a variety of social and task groups. As part of a social events group, Anne sponsored a visit to an American Opera. Allan has served on several ministerial search committees. Along with their children, Stephan and Laurie, they participated in Progressive Dinners and in monthly Family Group gatherings (where groups would meet for dinner at a special restaurant, go strawberry picking after Sunday morning worship services, or meet in each others' homes for meals). Drawing on their musical and theatrical experience, the Hartmans collaborated on a special summer worship service, with Anne playing the beautiful "Ashokan Farewell" and Allan reading a letter from a Civil War soldier. Allan also created the First Unitarian Dramatic Society and helped put on plays at FUSN and during the retreat weekends. Anne has been part of FUSN's longest running womens group, and Allan has been part of the informal Saturday morning tennis group that he and a few friends started 31 years ago. Allan also enjoys being a part of the chiming group that was started by Roberta Humez in 1982.

FUSN TREASURES (CONTINUED)

Looking back over their 43 years at FUSN, Anne concludes, "So many of our friendships have come from people we got to know here. It's just always been a big part of our lives." Allan adds, "I never felt I had a spiritual home until I came here." As I hear about all of the Hartmans' efforts to help make FUSN a strong community, and as I delight in the stories of FUSN events nearly forgotten, I am reminded that our long-term members themselves are beautiful treasures for FUSN.

OPEN-MINDEDNESS

FUSN has 6 Core Values which guide our actions. They are: spiritual growth, community connection, the inherent worth of every individual, social justice, open-mindedness, and education. Today we turn our attention to Open-Mindedness. What might open mindedness mean for UUs at FUSN?

When my daughters were in the RE program, we'd say with them: "we are the church of the open mind, the listening ears, the helping hands, and the loving heart." We'd include hand gestures toward the head, hands, and heart. Sometimes, it seemed as if the kids were offering a variant on 'see no evil, hear no evil, and speak no evil'!

Open-mindedness means being open to change, maintaining an open mind aware of the fact of "many truths" rather than thinking we own the one and only truth. This can be seen at FUSN in matters spiritual and social.

In the spiritual realm, some people may think that being open to many truths can put one at risk of standing for nothing. I'd offer that there is much to gain in being open to the many spiritual perspectives that have emerged over thousands of years on earth. This diversity of perspectives offers a person a personalized set of spiritual viewpoints. Instead of having to accept one tradition in its entirety, by maintaining an open mind, we can each pick the elements that most resonate from the smorgasbord of traditions. By critically examining each element, we can create a unique fabric of threads drawn from various traditions. And when a person handpicks each thread, that person is more likely to find meaning in the whole fabric.

So, my sense is that while maintaining an open mind may take more work as one contemplates each element of his/her belief system, the composite and ever evolving set of views is more meaningful in relation to the realities of one's life.

WANT TO SAVE ENERGY?

On Sunday, Jan. 20, beginning at noon with lunch of Eric Olson's famous homemade bread and Laurel Farnsworth's excellent soup, the Green Sanctuary Committee and Adult RE will present Rachel White of Greener Every Day Consulting. Rachel is an energy expert who helps homeowners and architects get energy conservation right. She is knowledgeable about everything from better insulation coupled with better ventilation so noxious chemicals don't build up inside tightly sealed buildings, to better choices for energy efficient living. In her talk to us, Rachel will address the impact of behavior and personal choices on home energy consumption. How much of a difference can conservation efforts (such as turning off lights, shutting down computers and entertainment systems, and turning down the heat) make on home energy use? Which efforts make the most difference and which aren't worth bothering with? Is conservation ever counterproductive? What is the relationship between conservation and efficiency? She is very approachable and will take on questions about any home energy improvement project and point questioners to good sources of more information.
