Dr. Lynda Bolduc-Hicks - Lynda Bolduc-Hicks is a psychologist, wife, mother, and relatively new parishioner in the FUSN community. Married for twelve years, she and her husband Paul live in Newtonville with their two children, Shane (9) and Gavin (6). Shane is a highly imaginative boy who enjoys animals, creative activities, and especially anything related to his favorite holiday: Halloween! Gavin is a fun and adventurous boy who loves outdoor activities, animals and playing with his big brother.

Dr. Lynda earned her Masters in Counseling Psychology from Northeastern University in 1996 and her Doctorate from the Massachusetts School of Professional Psychology in 2002. She is currently a licensed Clinical Psychologist at Psychological Care Associates in Stoneham, where she has been since 2008. Prior to that, she was at the Cambridge Health Alliance Victims of Violence Program (VOV), working with survivors of trauma and coordinating a Wellness Program with Boston area First Responders. Her husband, Paul Hicks, is a Central Processing Supervisor at the New England Organ Bank, where for fourteen years he has been working to "give the gift of life."

Raised in a Protestant family, Lynda attended services intermittently during her youth but didn't find the hoped for understanding or comfort in those teachings. Consequently, as an adult, she has traveled a more spiritual path alongside her academic route. This has included earning certifications to teach yoga and perform Reiki II (energy healing), as well as learning about mindfulness, gemstones and crystals, and chakra healing. Although this path has enriched her life in ways she could never have imagined, she found that she needed more to deal with the tragic and sudden death of her sister on July 4 2010 from suicide, and in raising her children amidst this and other challenges in life. She is grateful for the FUSN community for giving her solace and comfort at such a difficult time after this loss. In addition, she is thankful for the FUSN community continually feeding her families' spirit each week through music, dance, laughter, wisdom, kindness, support, and a caring that can all be felt in this community like a refreshing dip in a warm, sparkling pool on a sunny day, no matter what the weather outside. For these reasons she has chosen to become a member, continuing to define herself with the addition of these new FUSN experiences.

Jamie Freed - Jamie Freed's husband, Bob MacWilliams, and their daughter, Bess (Lee), began regularly attending FUSN in 2003 and Bess participated in the RE Program. Jamie occasionally attended FUSN services for the next 6 years after dropping their older daughter, Maddie, off at Prozdor Hebrew High School on Sunday mornings. Her involvement in FUSN grew during Bess' Coming of Age year as did

her appreciation for the community and the RE Program. Her experience as a mentor in the COA program this year further deepened her ties to FUSN and has compelled her to become a member. A social worker by profession, Jamie serves as Director of Adult Services at the Asperger's Association of New England in Watertown, where she has worked since 2002.

Karen Honig - Karen first attended FUSN services when her daughters were teens. She drifted away for a decade or so, but returned when she heard that Erin was the new minister. She joined FUSN because she is seeking a community which is socially active and is also a place where she can go to quiet the outside world.

Karen is a Certified Holistic Health Counselor who works to help men and women optimize their health without dieting. She explains, "many of my clients want to lose weight, while others suffer from gastrointestinal and inflammatory issues. I really love my work, helping people lead healthier lives."
