One event that we are very excited to announce now is a common read and conversation with the author. On Saturday Nov. 1 Debbie Irving will join us for a reading and discussion about her book Waking Up White, and Finding Myself in the Story of Race.

Newly retired Episcopal Bishop of New Hampshire and current Senior Fellow at the Center for American Progress Gene Robinson, says that "Irving's personal and moving tale takes us on an adventure to a world utterly new to her as she wakes up to the reality of how, without her knowledge or active pursuit, she

FROM THE BOARD

It is abundantly clear that the FUSN community is extremely pleased with the work of senior minister, Erin Splaine and that the congregation is flourishing at this time. In the words of committee member Jud Leonard, in providing his own summary, "By far, the predominant response to our survey questions was praise for Erin with delight about the general state of the society." Congregants gave high marks to Erin's sermons, the organization of Sunday services, her sensitivity with pastoral care, her strong administrative skills, and the assets of her personality including humor, authenticity, and warmth. Many felt that FUSN is enjoying a period of exceptional vitality and potential and that this can, in large part, be credited to the leadership of our senior minister. Erin was lauded for her ability to connect with youth as well as actively reaching out to senior citizens in the community. Several comments spoke to the fact that this minister was able to personally connect to everyone in their family across generations. The apparent cohesion of the staff was recognized and applauded in addition to the overall governance of the society. There was a level of excitement and relief discerned in the feedback received, as well as high expectations for the future.

In terms of areas for potential growth for the minister, these included more transparent communication, responsiveness (particularly to e-mails), and expanded support for social action and outreach beyond the church congregation.
