BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Sometime during the last year it became apparent to me that I needed to become more educated and active in relation to the climate crisis. I was inactive, undereducated and in a state of despondent denial. Given that CO2 was fast approaching 400 ppm in the atmosphere, I was not satisfied with myself.

Maybe it was the succession of weather events that rocked the US. Maybe it was learning that the oil derived from 'fracking' was both seductive in its apparent abundance and destructive due to the collateral damage from such oil. Maybe it was from realizing that my carbon footprint was putting my children and grandchildren at significant risk.

It came together for me when I saw the <u>Do the Math</u> video shown at FUSN. It was simulcast at 900 churches across the US. If you have not seen it, I encourage you to go to www.350.org and watch it. Bill McKibben, the leader of 350.org, has summarized the numbers related to the climate crisis and issued a challenge to me and to others to wake up and join the movement to alter the path we are all on toward global warming. His organization has given us all a number of actions we can take to change what otherwise seems inevitable.

Several people within FUSN are taking concrete steps to educate us all about our choices, and these same people will be coming to you to hear your thoughts. Many of these FUSN members are on the Green Sanctuary Committee. They have visited the FUSN Board of Trustees and are engaging the Board of Investment at FUSN on this issue. As a result, a number of us are interested in exploring the question of divesting stocks associated with CO2 emissions from the FUSN stock portfolio. A number of colleges, universities and religious communities across the US are seriously contemplating this action. This tactic was previously successful in addressing societal concerns related to Apartheid and tobacco. In addition, I am also exploring whether my personal investments can become CO2-free as a way of pushing oil/coal companies to urgently change their focus toward sustainable energy sources.

Through all this I am reminded why I am a member of FUSN. Our community keeps me educated and helps me to find ways to translate my values and concerns into action. The climate crisis is not the first or last instance of this benefit that I get from FUSN but perhaps this topic is the most important to the children in my family and yours. *-Jon Reuman, Board of Trustees*
