Founded in 1978 to promote racial harmony in response to the Boston school busing crisis, the East Boston Ecumenical Community Council (EBECC) is a neighborhood-based organization that today promotes the advancement of Latino immigrants of all ages through education, services, advocacy, community organizing, and leadership development. Latinos constitute approximately 50% of the residents of East Boston. EBECC's programs include:

- helping immigrants to secure work permits, documented immigration status, green cards and citizenship;
- providing students at the East Boston High School with homework assistance, computer access, counseling and field trips;
- providing leadership opportunities for young people to advocate for immigrants' rights such as the passage of the Dream Act;
- conducting ESL classes for adults, especially Latinas, by providing child care;
- conducting voter registration drives; and
- helping parents advocate for the needs of their children attending the Boston Public Schools.
