SOCIAL ACTION MEETING

At the Council on Social Action meeting on March 11 at 11:45 a.m., Bill Horne will make a short presentation about the work done by East Boston Ecumenical Community Council (EBECC) on behalf of Latino immigrants. Latinos constitute approximately 50% of the residents of East Boston. EBECC is a neighborhood-based organization that:

- helps immigrants to secure work permits, documented immigration status, green cards and citizenship;
- provides students at the East Boston High School with homework assistance, computer access, counseling and field trips;
- provides leadership opportunities for young people to advocate for immigrants' rights like passage of the Dream Act;
- offers ESL classes to adults, especially Latinas by providing child care;
- conducts voter registration drives; and
- helps parents advocate for the needs of their children attending the Boston Public Schools.

EBECC was founded in 1978 in response to the Boston school busing crisis to promote racial harmony. Bill Horne has served on EBECC's Board of Directors for the past twenty years. More information about EBECC can be found at http://www.ebecc.org/english/about.htm.

BARB'S BANTERING

Grace Happens

Unitarians, Universalists, and Unitarian Universalists have long been uncomfortable with, and even adversarial towards, the concept of grace. In the European Christianity from which both Unitarianism and Universalism emerged, grace is traditionally understood as an expression of love from an infinitely kind deity towards a fallen and undeserving humanity. Such grace is the source of salvation, whether in life or after it.

For some of us, grace can be a difficult word to use and a challenging concept to accept. Our Universalist heritage was all about grace. Our Universalist heritage taught that God had unconditional love for humanity, and this love was described as grace.

Grace is sometimes present in the moments when our gratitude fails us or when we reflect upon our experiences and realize that we are not living up to our ideals. Grace is present when we feel like life is giving us an unfair challenge but we handle ourselves well despite (or because of) the stress. Grace holds us up when we can't go on. And sometimes grace is a personal extension of the power of a church community.

In the Children's Religious Education program we have created a new volunteer position, titled "Sunday Supervisor," though there are Sundays when this position might better be titled "Bringer of Grace." Imagine a Sunday when several teachers called in sick, last-minute subs needed to be prepped on lesson plans, special projects were aplenty and visiting families were attending for the first time.

With the help of the Sunday Supervisor, all classrooms were prepared for classes, teachers were prepared, projects were explained and most importantly, everyone who entered the building was warmly greeted.

This display of grace reminds us that we can live out an unconditional love in the world. And we can help to bring it into being for others.
