FROM THE BOARD

The Board of Trustees and many of you who are involved in committee work and event planning at FUSN had an opportunity this past weekend to work with Mark Ewert, a stewardship consultant affiliated with the UUA. The original impetus for bringing Mark in was to assess our readiness to conduct a capital campaign, something that was last done about 10 years ago and which some feel is needed again soon.

From Friday Nov. 14 – Sunday Nov. 16, Mark conducted a "Next Steps Weekend," consisting of meetings with congregational leaders and others. Having now been through the weekend and the congregational self-assessment some of us did leading up to it, I feel that the Next Steps Weekend was an exercise whose value goes way beyond any question about a capital campaign. It offered us an outsider's perspective (yet from someone intimately familiar with UU congregational and fiscal life) on life at FUSN – from our membership, leadership and stewardship cultures, to the soundness of our financial and physical structures, to our governance – even down to our need for a better-constructed flip-chart stand!

The Board, the Ops Council chair, and the ministers met with Mark on Friday evening, and again after the service Sunday. On Friday, he asked broad questions and listened as we spoke about things like the meaning of stewardship, and FUSN's vision and direction. On Sunday, he reflected back to us some of what he'd heard from us on Friday and from other lay leaders on Saturday. He told us he found FUSN a healthy, vibrant congregation with a beautiful and well-maintained building and a bright future. He also shared his thoughts about where some of our

We're certainly not ready to make any decisions about a capital campaign, but I can say that it's likely we'll have to do some other work before we're ready for that step. Stay tuned – more to come!

I can't close without telling you what a joy it was to participate in Music Sunday. Your enthusiastic response was so heartening, and Anne Watson Born was inspired in her choices of music and poetry, as well as her construction of the entire service. Our stewardship consultant's interlude was a bizarre but necessary intrusion, but the postlude brought us right back into the spirit and brought the house down! How lucky are we, to have such a skilled and inspiring musical and spiritual leader on our staff?!

Project STEP (whose students played here in a memorable concert in October) was awarded the the prestigious National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award. Chosen from a national pool of more than 350 nominations and 50 finalists, Project STEP is one of 12 programs across the country to receive the award, which is the highest honor for such programs in the United States. The award is administered by the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities. Project STEP was recognized for its rigorous, comprehensive year-round classical string training program for minorities that invites them into the world of classical music, from which they have traditionally been excluded.

Last year's winner of the NAHYPA was the Boston Children's Chorus. Their annual Holiday Concert will be on Saturday Dec. 13, at 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at Old South Church in Boston.
