PERRY'S PONDERINGS

Responding to poignant questions in small groups, we were asked to share personal stories at the Adult Faith Development Renaissance Module. A woman and I had similar stories about putting aside our own beliefs to be there for relatives in the way they needed spiritually at the end of life. In the sharing of our stories, we experienced the transformative learning and faith development we want to facilitate in our congregations.

Renaissance Modules are learning intensives designed for Unitarian Universalist religious educators and interested lay leaders. In attending this module together, Alice Wood, Co-chair of the Adult RE Committee, and I were able to reflect on FUSN's Adult RE program in the context of transformative learning. Transformation happens when we experience emotional discomfort, but remain open to learning and form new meaningful interpretations.

The module leaders defined spirituality as "an individual's personal experience of the sacred, or that which gives life meaning." Faith development and formation is the coming together of spiritual experience and our Unitarian Universalist identity. In our community at FUSN, we have the opportunity to share our personal shimmering moments and that becomes a spiritual experience in itself.

This year in Adult RE we are presenting Topic
Tuesdays that explore a life issue or transition –
divorce, care for the caregiver, downsizing, and loss of
a loved one. Families for Depression Awareness
recently held a presentation at FUSN on recognizing
depression and getting loved ones help. For each of

MUSINGS

Since September I've been preparing four settings of the Gloria, the 2nd major section of the Catholic Mass. At FUSN, on Dec. 8, we will sing the Glorias of the Baroque composer Antonio Vivaldi and the contemporary composer Carol Barnett. In Harvard (MA), we're working on the setting by Francis Poulenc, commissioned by the BSO in 1959. And in February I'll conduct the Gloria (and a lot more) in a performance of J.S. Bach's *Mass in B Minor*. It's interesting to see how these works vary -Bach's Gloria, for instance, was composed in 1733 as part of a gift to a politician from whom Bach wanted a favor - a new title and more money. It is a highly elaborate work with combinations of voices and instruments beautifully designed to illustrate each phrase of the text. Poulenc's work has serious, dramatic moments and humorous passages of his setting of the "Laudamus te" he said, "While writing it I had in mind those Crozzoli [Gozzoli] frescoes with angels sticking out their tongues, and also some solemn-looking Benedictine monks that I saw playing football one day." Vivaldi's setting is dancelike, bright and transparent, a straight-ahead, beautifully crafted work with nary a note out of place. And Carol Barnett's Gloria, part of her "bluegrass mass", uses a paraphrase of the traditional text, and incorporates a fiddle, guitar, mandolin and banjo.

The Gloria section of the Ordinary (Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, Agnus Dei) of the Mass opens with the words of the angels from Luke 2: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace" and consequently this section of the Mass is often heard in the Christmas season. After the opening, the rest of the text is a Trinitarian doxology, both praising and asking for forgiveness. Not text we usually sing in a modern Unitarian Universalist service, but for me the music offers us much-needed joy and beauty during the craziness of the season. Carol Barnett uses texts by the poet Marcia Chamberlin for her Mass; her Gloria begins: "Glory be to God on high, Who launched the sunlight, loosed the rain, Who scattered stars across the sky, Who piled the mountains, rolled the plains, Oh, Glory be, oh, Glory be." And it concludes: "Oh, Glory be the generous Hand Who left us to our work and care, Who gave us only few commands But that we help each other bear Life's burdens. Pain and suffering ease. Oh, Glory be, oh, Glory be."

And there it is, summed up, present in all of these works: wonder, generosity, serious purpose and beauty, wrapped up in glorious bursts of joy. -Anne Watson Born
