#### **PERRY'S PONDERINGS**

At the Ferry Beach Sunday morning worship, youth Michael, Alison, Kieran, Julia, and Ian acted out *The Warm Fuzzy Tale*. Everyone born in their village received a bag full of warm fuzzies that people freely gave to one another. A bad witch changed that by creating the notion of scarcity and introducing cold pricklies. Then a happy woman came along who inspired the children to give away an abundance of warm fuzzies. The adults were worried and made it illegal, but the children continued anyway. The story says that the outcome is unknown and you can help by giving away warm fuzzies. That is exactly what we did, passing out fuzzy balls of yarn and asking everyone to exchange strands while sharing kind words. The joyous feeling went beyond the strands.

The moment became an opportunity to feel care and connection in our FUSN community across the ages. It was made possible by gathering as a multigenerational community. Sometimes youth are asked to provide service, but at Ferry Beach they were full participants. In the cafeteria at lunch it was wonderful to see smiling people of all ages sitting across from one another with strings of warm fuzzies. Some people had been moved to tears earlier because the exchange touched that deep place of longing for connection.

That afternoon a few of us were tossing around the football when three of the children piled on each other going after the ball. Miles was crying because his ankle got hurt. His mother reminded him that he had a warm fuzzy. She rubbed it over his ankle and then Miles stuffed a few strands in his sock. He stopped crying and soon was playing again. Sometimes healing is just being reminded that warmth is around us.

# **OPERATIONS COUNCIL UPDATE**

**The Operations Council** is now in its 4th year of existence under the trial period established by the Board of Trustees to see how the new governance structure would work. Both the Board of Trustees and Operations Council believe that we are ready to propose amendments to FUSN's bylaws to make the Operations Council a permanent part of FUSN's governance. Of course, any bylaws amendments require a vote by the congregation. Members of the Operations Council and the Board are meeting to consider what

bylaws changes are needed. We are also working on plans for various meetings with the congregation to explain the proposed bylaws changes and to solicit input from the congregation. We will provide the congregation with more information as our plans develop.

#### PROJECT ZAMBIA SECOND COLLECTION

FUSN's Project Zambia team wants to thank all of you who have supported our work to educate AIDS orphans and vulnerable children in Zambia since 2000 when the FUSN community began to support the work of Communities Without Borders in Zambia.

We're delighted to report that this summer eight FUSN service volunteers traveled to Lusaka as part of the annual visits to the communities CWB supports in Zambia. These volunteers—adults and youth—saw first hand how our work has transformed children's lives. Our Zambian students have done well, many graduating from primary school to secondary school. As you may remember, FUSN is linked to a compound called Chawama.

But as we have said in the past, success comes at a price. Each secondary school student has three times more expenses: books, bus costs and fees.

Unless we raise more funds this each year, we will not be able to support the children who started school over the last 12 years. In fact we may have to tell children and their caretakers in Chawama's preschool, which we support, that they have to wait another year to start primary school.

We are very pleased to announce that a small group of FUSN members have agreed to match, dollar-for-dollar, every donation we can gather up to \$7,000. So, \$7,000 will become \$14,000. We are lucky to be in the midst of such a generous community.

#### MUSINGS

Several singers from FUSN were thrilled to be a part of a truly collaborative experience on Sept 30, when we sang the 4th movement of Beethoven's Choral Symphony, the "Ode to Joy," with the Boston Korean Chorus and the MIT Chorus. The individual choirs began preparing in August and then spent a good chunk of a week singing and talking together. It was a cross-cultural and generation gap-defying event. I went from groaning about the rehearsal schedule to feeling completely inspired by the music and the camaraderie. That's what making music together can do, and we try to do that here as well. So...when I post our somewhat intense rehearsal schedule for the next month, I hope you will take a chance and come and sing with us.

The next months will be filled with music in many different styles which we hope will reflect the different facets of our Sunday worship themes. In October we'll be contemplating God while singing music by Carson Cooman, Brahms, and the gospel songwriter Richard Smallwood. The beautiful solo "Adonai Ro'i," a setting of Psalm 23, will also be sung.

November 4th will feature music from the Renaissance period, and on Veteran's Day (Nov. 11) our men's choir will debut, singing "Find the Cost of Freedom" and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot". Nov. 17 is the fall Music Sunday, our annual collaborative effort which brings together our many musicians, not just to make music together, but to create a beautiful worship service together.

Music Sunday is going to be a cool collection of music related to the November worship theme of death. We invite you to join us by singing with the Sanctuary Choir, the Family Choir, or the Gospel Choir; or by playing in the orchestra or band. We'll sing a movement of J.S.Bach's Cantata 140, accompanied by a string ensemble. The cantata refers to the parable of the wise and foolish virgins, which is a kind of warning to be prepared for the Day of Judgement. So we will also sing some Sacred Harp tunes and some gospel songs, including the Rani Arbo version of "Oil in My Vessel." Our intergenerational chamber orchestra will be playing music by Bruch and Holst, and Creationdance will dance. We hope to welcome some of the fine singers of Youth pro Musica to our service as well.

We close out the month on November 25 with the intergenerational Thanksgiving service, a joyful time to sing with our families - and recover from any possible excesses! -Anne Watson Born

FUSN's Green Sanctuary Committee will be periodically sharing tips and research news, about living more lightly on the planet. Our first announcement follows: We are pleased to pass on an important finding from Stanford Univ. researchers: The offshore wind resource from Florida to Maine could satisfy 100% of the electric power demand of the eastern third of the United States. The lead author notes that in practice, 40% to 50% of our region's power should be supplied in this way, with solar and other sources making up the difference. As the Cape Wind case shows, offshore wind can be controversial, but it is even harder to find suitable land-based sites in the Eastern US for giant wind machines.
