Yes, you <u>can</u> sing it all - join the choir for the November Music Sunday this year as we sing the cantata *Sources* by Rev. Kendal Gibbons and Rev. Jason Shelton. Each movement of the work is in a different musical style: modern classical, Latin groove, meditative chant, gospel, new age, Broadway and hip hop. The work is scored for piano, strings, drum set, percussion, and choir. There are many solo opportunities and much of the music is suitable for all ages.

"We have this marvelous statement about theological diversity in the Sources, but it largely gets ignored," he says. "Most of our folks can talk about the Principles in glowing terms, but they're a statement of covenant among congregations and how we will be in the world. The statement about what we believe is a statement about diversity. and that's the Sources." Sometimes UUs will omit or speak dismissively of theological traditions that we actually claim as our Sources. That bothers Shelton, the associate minister for music at the First Unitarian Universalist Church in Nashville.

"There are differences between us that are real and substantive, and if we let them, they could tear us apart," he continues. "If we don't engage with what it means to be Christian in a UU setting, or humanist in a pluralist setting, then we are lacking the tools to be in community with one another. Instead of watering everything down to the theological least common denominator, we need to be in integrity with each of our Sources—not watering down Christianity so the humanist feels comfortable with it, or watering down humanism so the pagans feel comfortable with it. Sometimes there will be things that express your theology and make me feel uncomfortable, but I will grow spiritually by being in community with you, who sees things differently."

# CRIMINAL JUSTICE SPEAKER SERIES

Tuesday evenings 7:00-9:00 p.m.

Sept. 15 - RSVP (Resolve to Stop the Violence Project) presented by Charlotte Simpson and Dr. Margaret Seater, attending physician at Mass General and instructor at Harvard Medical School. "Manhood and Violence: Fatal Peril," a film of men engaged in this intense group learning, will be shown. Chapel

Sept. 29 - Detention of Undocumented People – Presented by Gabriel Comacho, American Friends Service Committee. The Trust Act, a bill currently before the Mass. Legislature, will be discussed. 300 are held in detention at Suffolk County House of Correction awaiting trial. Alliance Room

Oct. 13 - Justice Reinvestment – Presented by Ben Forman, research director, MassInc. Massachusetts has adopted an evidenced-based model to deliver a far more cost-efficient way to make policy and decisions regarding programs. A cluster of bills have been filed to address drug sentencing, motor vehicle licenses, job development, bail reform, placement of prisoners in hospice care. Chapel

October 27 - Proposed changes in the Massachusetts Parole Process, presented by Lead Sponsor, State Representative Dave Rogers, 24thMiddlesex District His bill would require the Parole Board to justify the denial of parole after a risk and needs assessment. Prisoners deemed ready would be released six months before they complete their sentence. Chapel

Nov. 10 - Houses of Healing, an emotional literacy rehabilitation program which has been offered in prisons throughout the country. Presented by Robin Casarjian of Boston, who designed the program over 25 years ago. Chapel

Nov. 24 - Evidence-based intervention program for 17-24 year old high risk men, based in Chelsea, Boston and Springfield with 21 statewide centers. Presented by John Ward, public relations officer for Roca. Alliance Room

Dec. 15 - A Restorative Justice Approach to Sex Offenders. Presented by Ros Winsor, criminal justice advocate, social worker. She will describe and show a 45 minute video about Circles of Support and Accountability, a successful method of managing sex offenders used throughout Canada and a number of other countries. She will also report on the work of the Massachusetts Sex Offender Recidivism Commission, which is meeting monthly to study and formulate new policy options. Chapel
