SHARING OF JOYS AND CONCERNS

For the last year we, as a community, have been considering how to keep the Sharing of Joys and Concerns as a regular part of our Sunday worship service — most UU congregations of our size have found alternative ways of including them in their services. We will be making a decision as to how best to proceed in the coming months. In the meantime, please keep in mind the following guidelines: 1) The moment of sharing is meant to be a time of personal sharing and not a time to make a political point or a general announcement; 2) sharing and lighting a candle is just the beginning of our chance to share with each other and is best to be as brief as you can — "name but not explain." As you decide what and how to share know that you will be inviting others to speak with you during coffee hour and other moments during the week; 3) If you have had a chance to share several times over the course of a month or so please give others who maybe a bit more hesitant a chance to share.

MUSINGS



Rehearsals are beginning for the first Music Sunday, which will be Dec. 8. The choir will be singing the joyful and exuberant *Gloria* by Antonio Vivaldi.

"Antonio Lucio Vivaldi composed this *Gloria* in Venice, probably in 1715, for the choir of the Ospedale della Pietà, an orphanage for girls (or more probably a home, generously endowed by the girls' "anonymous" fathers, for the illegitimate daughters of Venetian noblemen and their mistresses). The Ospedale prided itself on the quality of its musical education and the excellence of its choir and orchestra. Vivaldi, a priest, music teacher and virtuoso violinist, composed many sacred works for the Ospedale, where he spent most of his career, as well as hundreds of instrumental concertos to be played by the girls' orchestra. This, his most famous choral piece, presents the traditional Gloria from the Latin Mass in twelve varied cantata-like sections." [Peter Carey, Royal Free Singers]

The writer Charles de Brosses said 1739, "The girls sing like angels, and play the violin, the flute, the organ, the oboe, the cello, the bassoon, in short there is no instrument large enough to frighten them." Your Sanctuary Choir would be a tad frightened at the thought of playing the bassoon, but they are very excited to sing the *Gloria*. We hope you will join us. Rehearsals are Wednesdays, 8:00-8:45 p.m., in the Chapel. There will be some Sunday rehearsals as well. Contact Anne for more information (music@fusn.org)

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FROM THE BOARD

A new year has just begun for all of us at FUSN, and for me, it's a New Era as well: I've just begun serving on FUSN's Board of Trustees. I'm honored that you have entrusted me with the responsibility of helping to guide the Society's policies, planning, finances, and governance. Of course, all FUSN members share in those responsibilities – service on the Board is just a more intense three-year focus on them!

For those of you who don't know me, here's a brief recap of my history with FUSN: I first came to FUSN in about 1989 with my family. My daughters both grew up here and experienced the full RE program. Over the years, I've taught RE, helped coordinate Youth Group, done various jobs at the Holiday Fair, served on two search committees, served on several standing committees (currently Music), led summer lay services, and sung with the choir.

So far, I'm still getting my feet wet in this new job. With our new governance model, FUSN's new Leadership Development Committee is charged with recruiting, developing, and training new lay leadership at FUSN. They recruited several "experts" and gave us new Board and Ops Council members a comprehensive orientation to our bylaws, the governance structure, and our finances this past Sunday. One of our hopes is for the Society to do better at preserving and passing on our institutional memory, and this session furthers that goal. This focus is also consistent with one of my own priorities for the Board: to keep communications open, flowing, and effective at FUSN.

As involved as I've been here, I'm painfully aware of how few people I know in a whole new generation of FUSN-ites. One of my personal aspirations for this year is to meet and get to know more of our relative newcomers. So please – look for me and speak to me at Coffee Hour!

PERRY'S PONDERINGS

Last Thursday, we went to my sister's synagogue in southwestern Connecticut, rather than the usual one we grew up in, so we could all go to the service together. The service was outside in a tent, which created a unique feeling to the worship. There was a different kind of intimacy to all of us being surrounded by the vast outdoors, yet in that small tent together.

The young rabbi happened to grow up in Boston and his sermon started off talking about the Red Sox and Fenway Park. I had come back to Yankee territory but was suddenly comfortably connected back to my new home in Newton. His sermon talked about how some places make us feel more connected and how our physical distance to what is happening affects our experience.

There are many ways to participate at FUSN, from attending the Sunday morning service to finding an array of activities, groups, and committees. In each of these, how closely we engage determines our connection. In Religious Education, we have classes for all ages, social events, topic presentations, social action opportunities, spiritual gatherings, holiday celebrations, and support groups.

You might attend an informative lecture but then take a step closer by getting involved in the follow-up discussion group. This year Adult RE is presenting four Tuesday Topics - Divorce Support and Care for the Caregiver in the fall, then Loss of a Loved One and Downsizing in the spring semester. Each will have a presentation one week and then an opportunity for deeper discussion two weeks later. Look for these and many other offerings in the Adult RE catalog that will be coming out this Sunday.

Our Sunday morning classes for children and youth explore Unitarian Universalist identity, values and ethics, world religions, social action issues, and creating healthy relationships and a sense of community. You can see the excitement from the pew when we commission teachers on Sunday, Sept. 22 and see the results of our journey together next June during the RE Celebration Service, or you can actually step closer to the experience of how we grow together by getting involved.

It might mean participating in a one-time event like our RE Music Sunday or a Justice Sunday. For others it might be joining an RE Support Circle that creates fun social events or programs that foster intergenerational connections. For greater connection, it could be a once a month commitment to teaching in the classroom, which is more of an exploration with children and adults than traditional teaching. The materials are provided and they are a springboard to learning, but the deeper transformation comes from being present to each other, in our "tent" together.
