

NOTE FROM ERIN

Last Sunday was wonderful. It was great to see so many familiar and new faces together for our Ingathering Service. We are embarking on our year together with energy and enthusiasm and that is a very good thing indeed. As we did last year, we are gathering on Sunday mornings with full hearts and a full Sanctuary — which brings me to this — one of the most challenging newsletter columns I have written in a long time. It is so because I need to raise a concern about how we do Joys and Sorrows in our Sunday worship service.

The moment in our service when we share the personal joys and sorrows of our lives is a moment that allows us the opportunity to celebrate and support each other. Joys and sorrows have been an integral part of FUSN's worship service for several years yet for the last couple of years they have made it difficult to plan our Sunday morning service. Primarily because Joys and Sorrows have grown to be much longer than the 5-7 minutes for which we prepare. Our worship service is the weaving together of many elements — music, spoken word, silence, prayer and personal sharing. By the end of last year our worship became a bit out of balance, as there were several services when Joys and Sorrows ran as many as 25 minutes long.

Many UU congregations of varying sizes have faced the same question that we now face. How can we amend but not necessarily end the sharing of Joys and Sorrows. The Lay Ministers and I began a congregation-wide conversation about just that last year.

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Of course what we found was there are almost as many thoughts about how we should move forward as there are members of our community. Some of you would like to continue just as we are, some had great suggestions as to how to do things differently and some would like to see Joys and Sorrows end all together.

As we begin our year and the possibility that we will have to change how Joys and Sorrows are structured let us all keep in mind a few guidelines that might help renew our balance as we go forward. First and foremost please remember that Joys and Sorrows are meant to be a moment of personal sharing and not a time to make a political point or a general announcement. As we enter the last stages of an extremely intense political season this point is especially important. Our Sanctuary needs to be a refuge from din of political chatter.

Second, sharing and lighting a candle is just the beginning of our chance to share with each other and is best to be as brief as you can. Some UU ministers have called the moment a chance to "name but not explain." As you decide what and how to share know that you will be inviting others to speak with you during coffee hour and other moments during the week.

And finally, if you have had a chance to share several times over the course of a month or so, please keep in mind that others might be hesitant to come forward if time is running short. There is so much that goes on in our lives: births and deaths; graduations and other accomplishments; engagements and weddings; illness and concern — in an effort to create more opportunities to share with each other the big and small moments in our lives we are setting up a new section of our newsletter "News of Our Community". As these moments happen in your life please send Fran (office@fusn.org) a sentence or two so that we can include your news in the newsletter.

Sharing the joys and sorrows of our lives is a moment that deepens our worship yet it is also a challenge. Together I am sure that we can find a way to enhance our understanding and knowledge of each other and yet maintain the balance that is so important to our shared worship service. As we continue to navigate our way through our new relationship with sharing of our Joys and Sorrows on Sunday morning, please feel free to talk with any Lay Minister or me.

OUR WORSHIP SERVICE: GIVING WORTH

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The first Board meeting for the 2012-2013 year was held June 12. We welcomed our new Board members, elections were held for officers, and the Ops Council was reelected. We convened again Aug. 14 to discuss some of the efforts to be undertaken in support of our new governance structure and the Society's financial health and infrastructure. The Leadership Development Committee held a "on-boarding" workshop for our new members. Our governance structure, budget, finances and financial policies, bylaws, and Board issues to be addressed this year were discussed. By the time you read this, the Board will have held its retreat on Sept. 8 with a focus on how we might best identify FUSN's long-range goals in light of its core values, and how we might best lead the congregation in pursuit of those goals. Then, on Sept. 11, we will hold our next regular Board meeting. MUSINGS

The conductor Robert Shaw, speaking of his tenure as Minister of Music at the First Unitarian Church of Cleveland, said:

"It was our idea that nothing which [people] had created that was of quality should be foreign to a service of worship. So we would do Hindu chants, Buddhist or Jewish religious music. We went through the complete Bach Resurrection cantatas in a mental ambience of a congregation that didn't believe the Resurrection story at all. Nobody in the congregation believed in the physical resurrection, or the Immaculate Conception, or the Virgin Birth, but it was possible to do these cantatas because Bach believed them. It was an expression of the nobility of [humankind] in his religious convictions. . ." (from *Dear People* by Joseph A. Mussulman)

The volunteers who make up your music program will be singing and playing a similar variety of music, including, on November 18, part of one of Bach's cantatas (#140, Wachet Auf). We welcome singers and instrumentalists of all kinds – singly or in pairs, in small groups such as the Flute Choir and our Band, and in large groups like our Sanctuary Choir and our Intergenerational Chamber Orchestra.
